2012 Summer Programs in Review

The Programs this summer for Children, Teens and Adults were so very successful. Attendance was by far, the largest ever recorded. We - FOTAL - would like to attribute that to our wonderful Librarians and staff.

CHILDREN's 'Dream Big: READ!' Programs and Reading: 1201 Signed up! 246 completed. 5640 books were read. 24 Programs were held. 1378 children attended the programs!!!

TEENS 'Own the Night' Reading Program: 162 Signed up. 28 completed. 185 books were read. 6 Programs were held. 73 teens attended the programs.

****** 28 TEENS volunteered at the Library! ******

They completed 239 hours of work.

Letter from our President

I am proud to be a volunteer for the Friends of the Alpharetta Library. We are a local group of volunteers who recognize that in this time of a tight budget, we can make a difference in the lives of the citizens of Alpharetta by helping to improve the needs of the Alpharetta Library. We also work hard to improve literacy needs in other areas surrounding Alpharetta as well as needs for our military personnel who are serving overseas.

Through October of 2012, we have achieved many accomplishments for the community as well as other areas in need:

We presented Alpharetta Elementary School with a \$10,000 grant to purchase needed reading and writing programs. That same grant amount will be presented to the school for the 2012-13 school year.

FOTAL held 20 book sales in 2011 and 2012.

Monthly, we donate thousands of books to a variety of sources including school libraries in Alpharetta and many other areas, Northside Hospital, a prison ministry in NW Georgia, a local Art Council program, the Backpack Program for Children, an Atlanta inner-city hospital and various other institutions.

FOTAL has provided the library with children and adult program funds as well as many materials such as books, audio books, DVD's, office supplies, etc.

Decorative items for the interior of the library are bought, bulletin boards are decorated, and plants/flowerpots are purchased, planted and maintained by FOTAL volunteers. The Alpharetta Garden Club assists in the plantings and the upkeep.

We gave a \$350 donation to the Atlanta Fulton Library System Foundation.

Three \$350 Scholarships are given annually to area high school Seniors. A \$500 scholarship was given to Gwinnett Tech to use for adults needing to purchase tests for their GED degree.

We support the Books for Soldiers national program by preparing and mailing boxes of books and supplies to our military forces overseas.

The annual Craft Show at our May book sale enables artists an opportunity to sell their craft/art items.

Hundreds of hours are donated by volunteers to sell books online and thus increase the budget.

FOTAL volunteers have helped to establish a library at Walker State Faith and Character Prison in NW Georgia. We supply not only books but craft items and other needs.

As the list shows, our volunteers are busy with having donated over 6,800 hundred hours in 2011. We thank the Mayor and City Council for their support plus the citizens who continue to donate their books for our sales. So far this year, FOTAL has sent 46 boxes filled with 782 books, 249 DVDs and 30 games to our Men and Women serving in the Army, Air Force, Navy and Marines.

FOTAL has spent (through September) \$485.00 for supplies and \$670 in postage to ship the boxes to their destinations. It's worth every penny and every minute spent getting the supplies and packing them up!!!

They have been sent mostly to Afghanistan, but sometimes the destination isn't actually known. Snacks, toiletries, and drink mixes are usually included along with those great cards and notes you and your children have written at every Book Sale. This is very important for those in remote areas where supplies and contact to home are far and few between. We've even sent laundry detergent.

Volunteering, continued

Fulton County has announced a \$30 million shortfall for 2013. That means the libraries will suffer too.

Due to retirements and cuts in budgets, the staffing at Alpharetta Library is meager. Your Library is actively seeking volunteers. If you have a few hours in the day or a few days a week, pitch in and spend it at the library helping the staff.

Volunteering

The Friends of the Alpharetta Library has consistently had more Volunteer Hours than any other of the 35 Fulton County branches. It's one of the smallest libraries but has the 4th largest circulation (number of books checked out). Ben Statham, President of FOTAL has volunteered more hours than any other person at any of the Libraries for the last 5 years! You see him around the library most days of the week. Yes, sometimes it's hard work - picking up boxes, shelving books, setting up for the monthly Book Sale, but the rewards out-weigh the work... most of the time!!! Regardless of the WORK - it makes you feel really good.

People choose to volunteer for a variety of reasons. Some to promote a cause they feel strongly about, such as caring for abandoned pets. Other people choose volunteerism as a way to attract positive attention from the media or general public, to advance their career or public image. Whatever the motivation, volunteerism has played a significant role in advancing and improving society.

History

The history of volunteerism in America began in colonial times. Survival required members of the community to help one and other. The first libraries were established when citizens donated books, and volunteers helped operate or raise funds to support the institutions. Harvard became the first American college after John Harvard donated over 400 books and funds. During the Revolutionary War citizens opened their homes for medical centers and volunteered their time to man the operation. Throughout history the work of volunteers has improved the educational, medical and overall quality of life for the general public.

Effects of Volunteering

Volunteerism can bring about social changes. When women were seeking the right to vote, volunteers banned together to fight for the cause. Volunteer movements, such as Habitat for Humanity, provides homes for families. Museum and gallery volunteers help promote the preservation of history, culture and arts, which better educates the populous. Volunteers can save lives when assisting during disasters or bringing medical attention to those in need.

Time Frames

- In 1736 Ben Franklin started the first volunteer fire department in America. That's no surprise!
-Clara Barton established the Red Cross in 1881.
-The United Way was formed in 1887.
-The Rotary Club was founded in 1910, and 6 years later the Lions Club and Kiwanis Club was founded.
-In 1919 the first Volunteer Bureau was opened, which focused on volunteer workers from the ranks of those released from war service.

So... find an organization - or a cause where you can give some of your time. Assist a teacher in a classroom, be a hospital candy striper, serve meals at a soup kitchen, there are countless other activities. You'll feel better - it will take your mind off your problems.... and it will benefit the people you volunteer WITH!
