Last year (last month?) ended an eventful year for FOTAL. The **GROUND BREAKING** ceremony for our new library took place. It looks very impressive. Drive down Academy and turn onto Haynes Bridge to see for yourself. The current projection is to open in the 2nd Quarter. We'll have more than twice the space and *PARKING!*

What happened in 2014 at the Friends......

Our Book Sales did well, but not quite as profitable as in past years. Weather in 2014 was not our friend! However, because of the sales and your loyalty, between the monthly sales and internet sales, we earned \$25,591.

This allowed us to do the following:

- * continue to donate a Literacy Grant to Alpharetta Elementary School for additional programs: \$8000
- * continue to award 3 scholarships to graduating high school students: \$1050, and funding for GED testing at the former Milton high school location: \$500
- * continue to send our Military men and women boxes of books, DVDs, snacks, hygiene products through the 'Books for Soldiers' organization: \$1643
- * donate funds towards a track chair for disabled Vets: (Independence Fund) \$765. The donation was in memory of a Library Staff's husband who was a long time supporter of FOTAL.
- * continue to pay for additional Children's and Teen programs and new books: \$5000
- * continue to pay for additional new Adult books and programs: \$3300
- * supplement the staff needs which were unfunded by Fulton County's budget: \$4200

And let's not forget that from the books you donated, we gave generously to requests for books from hospitals, clinics, school libraries, and charitable organizations.

At the yearly Fulton Library Volunteer meeting, FOTAL is regularly at the top of the list of number of hours worked. **Ben Statham** has been honored as *top Volunteer* consistently and he was again in 2014. Remarkably, Ben and his wife Linda, have been volunteers at the Alpharetta Library for 25 years.



FOOD FOR THOUGHT Chef Susan

Nothing takes the chill off a cold winter's day like a bowl of chill. Here's one of my favorite one's..

- 2 tbisp olive oil
- 1 medium onion, diced
- 2 cloves garlic, minced
- .5 lb. ground pork
- 1.5 lb. ground beef (90/10 fat)
- 8 oz. canned green chiles,
- 1 tblsp ancho chill powder
- 2 tbisp chill powder
- 1 tsp dried oregano
- 2 tsp cumin
- 1.5 tsp salt
- 2-12 oz cans diced tomatoes
- 1 can pinto beans, drained & rinsed
- 1 can kidney beans, drained & rinsed
- 1 can northern beans (do not drain)



Add fresh poblano or Jalapeno peppers If you like your chill spicier.

Books for Soldiers

The Friends have been sending books (plus DVDs, games, snacks, soap, shampoo, wet wipes, and such, through 'Books for Soldiers' for quite a few years. About 50 boxes are sent every year.

Those of you who come to our monthly Book Sales see the *Books for Soldiers* donation jar plus several blank cards at our tables inside the meeting room. Dear Friends and Patrons drop in coins and cash which we add to to buy items for our service men and women (supplemented by FOTAL). Kids write cards to the soldiers and draw pictures and take a toy from the bucket. Several of our 'regulars' always write! Those cards are included in the monthly shipments to soldiers.

We received 2 cards at last month's Book Sale from a 10 year old and an 8 year old. They were brother and sister and so insightful and caring to us who work the sale, that we thought they should be shared.

Card #1: 'Thank you for protecting our country and because you went in the Army, we now have freedom. We have reached our destination and our destination is our freedom'

Card #2: Thank you for serving our country. It's such an honor to have someone that cares so much. Me and my family admire that. Thank You! We GREATLY appreciate it. We wave this flag with pride and we salute every morning, knowing that someone is out there, serving for the US.' (note: there was a flag on the card).

Remember they are 8 and 10 year olds... no parent coaching them! It is amazing what they think of the troubles going on in our increasingly dangerous times.



The new Alpharetta Library is located next to the new City Hall in the Alpharetta City Center downtown. As you drive down Haynes Bridge Rd., you will be excited to see that the roof is almost finished and the outside walls are sheathed and partially bricked. We are amazed at the size of the building, all 25,000 square feet. That's a huge size increase from our present 10,000 sq. ft. structure. The library will have a very prominent view as you enter Alpharetta from Haynes Bridge Rd.

The most frequently asked question the Friends get seems to be, "When will the new library open?" We wish we had a definite time frame to tell you but we don't. At one time we were told that in the second quarter of this year, the building would be ready but we can't confirm that timeframe yet. We just know it will be exciting when it IS finished and occupied.

Heather Staniszewski is the Volunteer Services Manager and she gave us these numbers for the opening day collection. It will include 69,335 print volumes: This includes:

- Adult Print Collection: 43,630
- Young Adult: 1,555
- · Juvenile: 24,150

Last Wednesday the Fulton County Commissioners agreed to accept the presented budget which will allow ALL of the libraries to return to the former hours of operation. This will not take effect until April 1st.

In December, three new fulltime staff members were added to the present library staff. They are all busy readying the library for the move to the new building.

Mrs. Anne Haimes has been the Interim Library Director since Mr. John Szabo left as Director several years ago. Last week she announced her retirement. She has been the driving force for the construction of the new buildings. We owe her much gratitude for her support and hard work toward seeing these libraries come into fruition. We wish her a happy retirement and thank her for her support of the Friends.
